SENATOR KREMER: Oh, definitely, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So, then she knows you're not a gentleman, or do you pretend to be one when you're with her?

SENATOR KREMER: You know, I thought...I've withdrawn I think the last two times I've had something up that you objected to. I withdrew that, and I thought this time that you were going to think that, you know, let one go for two, was a pretty good bargain.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, what I'm going to do because my time right now is running out, but I'm going to put my light on again. I'm going to see how mean you intend to be to Senator McDonald who has never done anything to you since I've been in this Legislature. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator McDonald.

SENATOR McDONALD: Yes, Mr. President, there is a concern on my part. I do support the amendment that Senator Kremer is bringing to us. I happened to be absent the day that it was heard, but after reading through the amendment, I do support it. But I'm not sure that I support it at this point in time and at this late date, because we have quite a few other bills that we need to move from Select File to Final Reading. We're on the fifty-eighth day and to me this is certainly not the time and the place to offer an amendment that deals with a different state statute, so I'm saying this is not germane.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator McDonald. Senator Kremer, you have a right to say why it is. You're recognized to do so if you care to. Senator Kremer. He must have left. Senator Kremer? Senator Kremer, Senator McDonald has brought up the germane issue. You have a right to say why you think it is.

SENATOR KREMER: Well, I've stated that. But if it's going to cause a problem, which I promised to her in the first place...I thought it was an opportunity to get this bill passed.
