let me give you a second way in which it has a more real aspect. We have a public access in Norfolk. We've owned it, we've altered it. The Regional Center has changed. There are but they're facilities there that we do not need, asbestos-filled. There are developers who want to use it, but they can't get a TIF project to apply because the 15-year limit on TIF will not finance the cost-back of undoing asbestos. Senator Flood will tell you, the way we're going to do that is by able...by being able to sell only state-owned land or majority state-owned land under a TIF proposal that goes up to 30 years, which is a second provision in this measure. transition from the Norfolk Regional Center into the private sector, for somebody to rip down asbestos-filled buildings and put up something worth having and getting it onto the tax rolls, really does determine on whether this bill passes and goes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. The example makes it clear. And I have to give you credit. When Charlie McCarthy sat down, you immediately procured Mortimer Snerd.
