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SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: No fiscal.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And, actually, it might bring in more revenue to the university than they presently have, because you have to presume that these students who are unable to go at the triple rate, might be able to go at the regular rate. So they'll actually be paying tuition that wouldn't be coming in anyway.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: But what percent of, say, a Nebraskan that goes to the university, what percent of their tuition is paid for by the taxpayer?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, none. It's paid by the student or their parents or somebody in their family.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Are...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And that would be true of these students also. This isn't a benefit. We're not giving them tuition. We're letting them have the same tuition rate as any other student who's graduated from high school.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Well, I might be wrong here, but I thought that when a student went to the university there is a subsidy from the taxpayer or the Legislature to the university to cover a certain percent of that tuition,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well,...

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: ...and my knowledge of it, it is about 50 percent of the tuition.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: You know that we do give funds to the university for the...

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Right.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...education of our students, for the building of buildings. I don't want to take all your time, Senator Cunningham, but I think I could respond to your question very
