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What do they need in order to legally work in the United States?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: They need a work visa, as I understand it.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: So if we send somebody to five years to the university, by the time their five years is up, are they going to be able to work, or are they going to sit around another five years while they legally can't work anyway?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: You know, I think that by the time they get out they're going to be able to work. I mean, look what's happened at the national...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...level, Senator Cunningham.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Okay. Well, Senator Erdman did a very good job. Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Erdman did a very good job talking about the legalities of the bill.
