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That's a voluntary thing that has to be agreed to. If it does happen, nothing changes as far as our obligation to commit the \$40 million. If it does not happen, however, this amendment would give us greater flexibility with regard to how we commit our \$40 million in future years. It doesn't mean that we won't commit it to the early education program, but it means we will have the flexibility to commit it to either that program or to...back to the common schools. So, for example, if we were in trouble with regard to finding money for increased state aid, that would be a use that would be available to us in the event that the \$20 million of private funding did not come through. But probably, this amendment will be of no consequence, because hopefully everything will go as advertised, as planned, and the partnership will be formed. But that's the substance of the amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. You've heard the opening on AM3250. Open for discussion. Senator Beutler, your light is on. Did you wish for...thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Brashear.

SPEAKER BRASHEAR: Mr. President, members of the body, Senator Beutler hinted at the fact that we maybe don't see this amendment the same. But perfect being the enemy of good, the hour being what it is, the moment and opportunity being here and now, I urge the adoption of the Beutler amendment, provided that Senator Beutler doesn't discuss it at length any longer. (Laughter) Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Beutler, there are no lights on. Did you wish to close?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, I just wanted to comment on the drafting of the last three paragraphs a little bit. (Laughter) But...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I waive my closing, Senator.

SENATOR CUDABACK: The question before the body is, shall AM3250 be adopted? All in favor vote aye; opposed, nay. We're voting
