SENATOR HUDKINS: For custody.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But it doesn't say custody or is there something some place else that indicates this is restricted to custody?

SENATOR HUDKINS: No, it doesn't say it anywhere else.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Members of the Legislature, the language could mean that a person can sue for damages or any other thing that qualifies as a civil action. I will oppose this amendment and should it be adopted, I will oppose the bill. The Judiciary Committee often has advanced bills over my opposition, but that's what happens in a committee. But that doesn't necessarily mean in every case that I will oppose any and every form that the bill might take after it has come out here and maybe been amended. But there is no form a bill such as this could take which I would support. And I would suggest that my colleagues read the actual language of the amendment, see the kind of problems that the language itself will create, and determine if they think it ought to be added to this bill. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Further discussion? Senator Bourne. Is Senator Bourne on the floor? Senator Bourne waives his time. Senator Hudkins.

SENATOR HUDKINS: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I appreciate the discussion that has gone on. I just thought that this would be an ideal time. The bill that we're looking at is in the realm of what I'm trying to do. And you saw the article about these two boys and then the parents both dying. We perhaps could have, maybe not, saved those kids. But the father obviously has lost his son forever and that's really a shame. But I have been told that there are in the works some interim studies and that this possibly could be a part of one of those studies. And if that is the case, then I would withdraw the amendment at this time. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Hudkins, did you withdraw the amendment? It is withdrawn.
