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Section 44 that greatly alters the discussion. It just does. Contiguous, I've been on Urban Affairs for four years. I know what that means. That's problematic language. I'm not saying it's unconstitutional. I'm saying that creates problems and that creates action out here that promotes this type of behavior. I'm going to sum it up this way. Minds are probably made, okay. In a bicameral legislature, in a bicameral legislature there are checks and balances to deal with things like this. If we were a house, we could say let's let the senate deal with it. It's off our hands now.

SENATOR BAKER: One minute.

SENATOR FRIEND: Checks and balances, tools available, a process available in a bicameral. In a unicameral setup, we have less of those checks and balances, processes and procedures and everything else. But here's what we have. We have cloture. It's been used. One of the tools I'm going to use is cloture, and I am not going to vote to cloture this bill because the action I believe should be taken is what I've spoken to already, is an action that this Legislature steps back and it says, you know what? We've overreached, we've gone too far. It's time to make that decision. I will use the tools available to me, not because I'm that emotional about it, but because I think we're making a mistake. I think we're charging forward after five days of debate to make law that we're going to have to come back next year and fundamentally deal with when we don't have to. Mr. President, thank you.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Senator Friend. Senator Synowiecki followed by Senators Bourne, Smith, Brashear, and others. Senator Synowiecki.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Heidemann, would you yield?

SENATOR HEIDEMANN: Yes, yes.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Okay, Senator Heidemann, your amendment was selected as one of the super priority amendments. I think the Speaker is limited to five amendments, I believe.
