insist on getting more in exchange for their votes to support the city than they were getting. And I would chastise and chide them and say if I can do what I can as one person, imagine what the rural senators could do if they would clump together and really do things to help the people who live in the rural areas rather than just the ethanol purveyors. So I wanted to make that very clear. But there is something else I want to make clear, too, with the amendment that is before us. It looks very thick. It's what under ordinary circumstances would be called a white copy of the bill, because it contains everything we had done up to this point. But in the meantime, Senator Heidemann had an amendment and I had one which struck a few words from my original amendment. Rather than have two additional proceedings to adopt his amendment to the white copy and then my amendment to the white copy, they were both incorporated. And now what we vote on is the entire package, but everything else is what we had already adopted. So the only two things different in that huge amendment if you may have seen it, is Senator Heidemann's amendment...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and mine striking a few words. If you look at the handout that Senator Raikes gave you, that is the totality of Senator Heidemann's amendment. On about page...well, in Section 45 whatever it is, the words that I wanted to be sure had been stricken in fact have been stricken. So you have before you the amendment. I will support Senator Heidemann's amendment. I have never voted cloture since I've been in the Legislature. I don't think it's necessary for us to go to cloture. After we adopt the amendment, the Speaker can also set the order of motions or for motions. And a motion...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to suspend the rules and...excuse me, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: I said time, Senator.
