know if Senator Pahls has gone out and spoken to the suburban folks, and I would assume that they would do the same thing. Look, we're at 9:30, second to the last day of the legislative session and we're looking at a 158-page amendment. We've looked at a lot of the language before, I'll give you that, but not one of us has studied this extensively. My wife actually said that she wouldn't be upset with a special session as long as I didn't do it in the next two weeks because the baby is coming here on April 22, so anytime after that I'm available. But I want to renew my commitment to you. I think that this is too significant of a policy change to do this, even though I will absolutely concede to you that Senator Raikes has been working on this for some months. I'll tell you a little story. This will kind of illustrate how much work and how difficult that work has been for Senator Raikes. I was out in the lobby about ten days ago and I was meeting with a small group or coalition of suburban senators. I don't know if there were any urban senators, or excuse me, lobbyists, suburban lobbyists. I don't know if there was any urban lobbyists there or not, but I think there were. About 30 or 40 minutes into our conversation, one of the lobbyists kind of crossed his arms indicating to me that the conversation was over. And I said, I want to throttle you after 40 minutes. I don't know how Ron Raikes has put up with you for 52 days. And to this lobbyist's credit, he started laughing and he says, 52 days, he's been dealing with us for about 9 months. And I said, well, he qualifies for sainthood because I can't deal with you for longer than 40 minutes. But that's a little tongue in cheek. It's a difficult issue. Everybody's hearts are in the right place. They're trying to do the right thing. We're just disputing how it's done. The rules suspension is the wrong way to go in that it sets a precedent. My understanding years ago this used to be used all the time. I don't think I've ever seen the rules suspended in this regard in my eight years here. The motion has been tried several times. I do think it circumvents our process and our system.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute, Senator.

SENATOR BOURNE: Certainly a more appropriate way to do it would be a cloture vote. I also want to remind the body that if the rules are suspended that's a 30-vote measure whereas cloture, of
