DCS also provided the following information to explain its estimated fiscal impact:

DCS had 152 sex offenders discharge in CY 2007. DCS performed 77 evaluations and affidavits in CY2007. Of those evaluations 18 individuals were found to be dangerous sex offenders. The discharge planning services of the psychiatric social workers would need to be offered to all sex offenders and the psychiatric social workers would assist in identifying treatment options in the community.

If an offender was subsequently identified as dangerous by a DCS evaluator, the psychiatric social worker would work with community providers to determine if any of those providers could appropriately address the individual's risks and needs. In addition, an evaluator's recommendations regarding dangerousness are not made until after the evaluation is complete and some discharge planning information is important to consider as part of the evaluation process. A determination of dangerous is ultimately the decision of the mental health board as would be the approval of any treatment plan.
