Any Fiscal Notes received from state agencies and political subdivisions are attached following the Legislative Fiscal Analyst Estimate.

This bill incorporates recommendations contained in the Criminal Justice Reinvestment Report released in December 2021. This bills directs the State Court Administrator or the probation administrator to create three pilot programs. A report is due for each of the pilot programs to the Judiciary Committee on or before June 1, 2023. The bill directs General Funds to be used to fund the pilots. The pilot programs the State Court Administrator is to create are: 1) a pilot that utilizes physical space and technology resources for virtual behavioral health for court-involved individuals, 2) additional assistant probation officers to assist probation officers with high-risk caseloads and 3) a probation incentive program to provide gift cards, vouchers and other tangible rewards for probationers succeeding in probation. The Division of Parole Supervision is required to create a technical violation pilot program to provide residential housing within one or more Department of Corrections facilities for individuals who have committed technical violations of parole. A report is due on or before June 1, 2023, to the Judiciary Committee. The pilot is to be funded with General Funds. The Department of Corrections and the Department of Health and Human Services would have a new reporting requirement for inmates whose Medicaid eligibility was suspended. The bill also creates the Justice Reinvestment Oversight Task Force. The task force members are the chairperson of the Judiciary Committee, two members of the Legislature, four members appointed by the Governor and three appointed by the Chief Justice. The task force is to submit an annual report on September 1, 2023, and each year thereafter. Psychiatrists are added as an eligible profession under the Rural Health Systems and Professional Incentives. Additionally psychiatrists, psychologists and mental health professionals who practice for at least five years and a majority of their practice consists of treatment to members of the community supervision community would be entitled to their educational debt paid in full. The bill requires each judicial district to establish a problem-solving court. Problem-solving courts include drug, veterans, mental health, driving under the influence, reentry, young adult or other problem-solving courts. The cost would be \$4.41 million GF in FY 2023 and \$4.32 million GF in FY 2024.

For the assistance probation officer pilot the estimated impact is \$1.6 million in FY 2023 and \$1.55 million in FY 2024. The probation incentive program is estimated to cost \$38,450 GF in FY 2023 and FY 2024.

The pilot program that requires the State Court Administrator to provide space and technological resources for virtual behavioral health delivery has an unknown impact. Space is provided to Probation by the counties and would dependent on the situation in the selected judicial district for the pilot.

The changes in penalties will impact post-release supervision increasing the caseload of probation. The impact cannot be determined at this time.

#### **Department of Corrections**

The changes to certain penalties will reduce the number of persons sentenced to prison, but the extent of the reduction cannot be determined. The savings would be the daily per diem which is \$31.65 or \$11,551 annually for each person who would otherwise be in prison. The Department of Corrections indicates the cost to change programming for sentence calculations would be \$102,400 in FY 2023.

The Division of Parole and the Department of Corrections is to establish a pilot residential housing program for parolees who commit technical violations. The housing is to be located within one or more facilities as designated by the Director of Corrections. There would be costs to convert existing space in the chosen facility and staff and programming costs. Those projected costs are not available at this time.

## Department of Health and Human Services

The bill amends the Rural Health Systems and Professional Incentive Act. The Department of Health and Human Services estimates there would be 10 new loan repayment contracts for psychiatrists, psychologists and mental health professionals at a cost of \$50,000 a year for each practitioner. The current provisions of the Rural Health Systems and Professional Incentive Act require an agreement with a local entity. The local entity is responsible for one-half of the loan repayment. As written the impact for the Department of Health and Human Services is \$250,000 GF and \$250,000 GF for the Department of Corrections. The department indicates the need for a .5 program manager and .5 administrative specialist. Further information is needed on the workload to determine if additional staff are needed.

The new reporting requirement would cost approximately \$18,000 (\$9,000 GF and FF) in FY 2023 which can be absorbed within existing agency resources.

Technical Note: It is unclear which agency would be responsible for organizing and conducting the work of the Justice Reinvestment Oversight Committee. It is assumed the work would be handled by existing staff of the responsible agency.

### Explanation of Estimate:

LB 920 would require the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to update their system to correlate with reporting requirements needed for the bill. In order to implement the system updates and the changes described above, an estimated 80 Business Analyst hours would be needed for analysis, design, coding, and testing at a cost of \$5,200. An estimated 92 Batch Team Technical Analyst hours would be needed for analysis, design, coding, and testing at an estimated cost of \$8,280. An estimated 60 Gen Team Technical Analyst hours would be needed for analysis, design, coding, and testing at an estimated cost of \$5,400. The total estimated cost for system updates and changes is \$18,880.

LB 920 would also allow loan repayment for people who practice as psychiatrists through the Rural Health Systems and Professional Incentive Act. The payment will be for the total loan amount for a doctorate-level mental health student or master's level mental health student who practices psychiatry, psychology, or mental health practice. If fully implemented, a 0.5 FTE Program Manager I and a 0.5 FTE Administrative Specialist would be needed.

The student loan repayment contracts are an agreement between the state of Nebraska, the health provider, and the entity that provides the matching funds for the contract. It is estimated that there will be ten new loan repayment contracts each year. The estimated cost for each contract would be \$50,000 a year, for a total of \$500,000 a year for all ten contracts. The \$500,000 would be split evenly with the facility or organization employing the loan repayment recipient as a 50% cash match is required.
