LB 64 is the Lindsay Ann Burke Act. The bill requires the State Department of Education (NDE), on or before March 1, 2010, to develop a model dating violence policy to assist school districts in developing policies for dating violence reporting and response. On or before July 1, 2010, school districts are required to develop a policy to address incidents of dating violence involving students at school. The bill requires school districts to provide dating violence training to all administrators, teachers, coaches, nurses, student group sponsors and mental health staff responsible for students in grades 6-12. Newly hired staff shall be trained annually. Schools are to incorporate dating violence education into the health curriculum for students.

NDE estimates a one-time general fund fiscal impact of \$3,000 to develop policies. The department will also incur expenses to develop a rule and regulation. It is assumed that rule development can be handled with existing resources of the department.

The bill will have an unknown fiscal impact and workload increase for school districts to develop and publish dating violence policies, provide training to staff and incorporate dating violence into the health curriculum for students. The impact could vary considerably depending upon how the requirements of the bill are implemented in each school district.
