This bill, as amended, would exempt concealed handgun permitholders and peace officers from certificate to purchase a handgun requirements. It would change provisions relating to discharge of firearms. The amended bill would authorize natural resources districts to expend funds to contract with or enter into agreements with law enforcement agencies for the protection of public property and the enforcement of Nebraska laws at recreation areas owned or controlled by natural resources districts. The amended bill would change provisions relating to regulation of concealed handguns by stating that cities and villages shall not have the power to require registration of a concealed handgun owned, possessed, or transported by a permitholder. It requires the State Patrol to inform each permitholder that if a firearm is lost or stolen, the permitholder should notify law enforcement of that fact.

It appears that this amended bill will not have a fiscal impact to the state. The State Patrol estimates no fiscal impact.

The amended bill would allow a natural resources district to expend funds to enter into agreements for the services of certified law enforcement personnel or to contract for the services of private security services to patrol and protect district-owned recreation areas. This could cost the NRD's additional funds to hire law enforcement or private security, but any such cost is unknown at this time.

In a bill that was similar to AM2415 (LB1033), the City of Omaha stated that it could reduce revenue received from registration fees. They were unable to assess a dollar amount due to the uncertain number of guns that are registered.
