PRESIDENT: Ladies and gentlemen, we're about to start the proceedings for the afternoon, and we're very grateful to have with us Father Dawson this afternoon for our invocation. Would you please rise for Father Dawson.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Proceeding then to General File discussion on LB 70, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 70 was a bill that was introduced by Senator Smith. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 5 of this year, referred to the General Affairs Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. I do have committee amendments pending by the General Affairs Committee, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The Chair recognizes the Chairperson of the General Affairs Committee, Senator Smith. (Gavel.)

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Members of the body, we have committee amendments on the bill, on LB 70. What it will simply do is to strike language allowing the commission to charge a fee for the warning signs. The commission would then pick up the cost of producing and distributing the signs. The cost on...the original cost on it was approximately \$500.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Are you....

SENATOR SMITH: Did you want me to give a short version of what

were 17, they couldn't. It has been a problem in a number of areas as those agencies that came to me had identified. PRESIDENT: Senator Lamb, are you going to take the amendments, too.

SENATOR LAMB: Yes, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Okay.

SENATOR LAMB: The amendment is merely the emergency clause. I would move the emergency clause and then we will discuss the bill.

PRESIDENT: Very good. You didn't wish to talk about the

emergency clause, did you, Senator Moore? Okay. The question is the Lamb amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of committee amendments.

PRESIDENT: The committee amendments are adopted. Senator Lamb, on the bill.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, members, this is a bill I introduced at the request of a constituent who has a fish, commercial fishing permit, wants to clean out his lake which is mostly owned by this constituent, and sell the fish. And currently, he can sell the nongame fish. He can sell the carp is what we are talking about. He can sell the carp but he can't sell the bullheads. So this is merely giving a person in that situation the opportunity to, rather than just destroy the bullheads that come out of those ponds for fish management purposes, currently, because they are... bullheads are considered a game fish, they cannot be sold. And so after consultation with the Game and Parks Commission, this bill was drafted which was supported by Game and Parks. It merely would allow the sale of those bullheads which are seined. It does not change the status of bullheads as a game fish, but it does allow those fish to be sold or to be constructively used rather than destroyed. I would move the advancement of the bill.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion? If not, the question is the advancement of the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 166.

PRESIDENT: LB 166 is advanced. LB 353, please.

PRESIDENT: LB 172 passes. LB 194 with the emergency clause attached.

ASSISTANT CLERK: (Read LB 194 on Final Reading.)

PRESIDENT: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 194 pass with the emergency clause attached? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

ASSISTANT CLERK: (Read record vote. See page 714 of the

ASSISTANT CLERK: (Read LB 353 on Final Reading.)

PRESIDENT: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 353 pass? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

ASSISTANT CLERK: (Read record vote. See page 718 of the Legislative Journal.) The vote is 38 ayes, 0 nays, 1 present and not voting, 10 excused and not voting, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: LB 353 passes. While the Legislature is in session and capable of transacting business, I propose to sign and do sign LB 43, LB 80, LB 82 with the emergency clause, LB 106, LB 113, LB 166 with the emergency clause, LB 171, LB 172, LB 194 with the emergency clause, LB 200, LB 296, LB 321, LB 322, and LB 353. We will move on to Select File, LB 48.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 48 is on Select File. The body considered it briefly on Friday. At that time, Mr. President, Senator Bernard-Stevens had offered an amendment to the bill. The amendment is found on page 697 of the Journal.

PRESIDENT: Senator Bernard-Stevens, do you want to recall for us what your amendment is, please?
