for review by the membership. (See page 95 of the Legislative Journal.)

Mr. President, I received a report from the committee chair by Senator Lowell Johnson regarding a study of the Presidential Primary Study. That report is required pursuant to Statute 32-562. That will be on file in my office.

Mr. President, Senator Coordsen would like to announce that Senator Pirsch has been selected as Vice-Chair of the Business and Labor Committee.

Mr. President, two announcements, Senator Baack would like to have a meeting of the Government Committee for an organizational meeting, this morning at ten o'clock in the Senators Lounge; Government Committee, ten o'clock in the Senators Lounge. Mr. President, Senator Smith would like organizational meeting of the General Affairs Committee nine-thirty this morning underneath the north balcony; General Affairs, nine-thirty this morning, called by Senator Smith. Mr. President, that is all that I have at this time.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. We will move on to introduction of new bills.

CLERK: Mr. President, new bills. (Read LBs 190-201 for first time by title. See pages 95-97 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: We will leave the introduction of new bills for moment and move on to number seven, a motion on the election contest. Senator Warner. The chair recognizes Senator Warner.

CLERK: Mr. President, the motion offered by Senator Warner is found on page 34 of the Legislative Journal.

PRESIDENT: Senator Warner, please.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I'd move adoption of the motion. You will recall that there was a protest filed at the beginning of the session on one of the seats, and that the Credentials Committee was selected, I believe I indicated that the report which was filed by the Credentials Committee presumed that this motion would be offered. It is written in such a way that the same individuals CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the motion to advance the bill.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The bill is advanced. Anything for the record, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, yes. Mr. President, a motion from Senator McFarland to rerefer LB 225 from Urban Affairs to the Education Committee. That will be laid over. Judiciary reports LB 80 to General File, LB 82 General File, LB 200 General File, LB 201 General File, LB 204 General File, those are signed by Senator Chizek. Banking Committee reports LB 92 to General File with amendments attached, signed by Senator Landis as Chair. (See pages 451-52 of the Legislative Journal.)

Judiciary offers notice of hearing, Mr. President, for Friday, February 3, and February 22. Mr. President, in addition to that notice, a notice from Senator Warner, as Chair of the Credentials Committee regarding a meeting of that committee on Friday at twelve o'clock in Room 2102. That is all that I have, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Proceeding then to LB 142.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 142 was a bill introduced by Senators Baack and Conway. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 5, referred to Transportation, advanced to General File. I have Transportation Committee amendments pending, Mr. President. (See page 439 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BARRETT: The Chair of the Transportation Committee, Senator Lamb. (Gavel.)

SENATOR LAMB: Thank you, Mr. President. This is another bill similar to the last one, disabled American veterans license plate, \$5 fee. The committee amendments establish the \$5 fee, also provides the logo D.A.V on the bottom of the license plate, and then this bill is also used as a vehicle to change the fees for Pearl Harbor survivors and ex-prisoner of war special plates to be consistent with the \$5 fee, and provides for an effective date of January 1, 1990, so that these new plates will not have to be issued before the new round of plates are issued in 1990. So that would save that expense. The arguments in regard to the \$5 fee have already been made on the previous bill, and this amendment merely brings the disabled American veterans and the

SENATOR WESELY: For below and...okay. This says it's a Class III if it's below 100.

SENATOR CHIZEK: Class III, yes.

SENATOR WESELY: What is that? Do you know? Do you recall? I would just be curious.

SENATOR CHIZEK: It's...the maximum would be three months, 500.

SENATOR WESELY: Okay. Thank you. Appreciate that.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Chizek, would you like to close on the advancement of your bill?

SENATOR CHIZEK: Well, I probably would waive. Simply I would say if you're going to send...people are going to do to me what they did to Senator Chambers, send me <u>Sports Illustrated</u> and some of them, with that, I would urge advancement of the bill.

PRESIDENT: The question is the advancement of the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 200.

PRESIDENT: LB 200 is advanced. LB 201. Would you like to put something in, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: Mr. President, I would, thank you. Your Committee on Education, whose Chair is Senator Withem, reports LB 74 to General File, LB 398, General File, LB 499, General File.

Mr. President, with respect to LB 201, that's a bill offered by Senator Chizek. I have a unanimous consent request to pass that bill over at this time.

PRESIDENT: Any objection? If not, so ordered. We'll pass over LB 201. Move on to LB 106.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 106 is a bill offered by Senator Moore. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 5, referred to Urban Affairs, advanced to General File. I have no
