PRESIDENT: That was the closing. The question is the adoption of the resolution. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk, please. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of LR 5.

PRESIDENT: The resolution is adopted. You have some new bills, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, I do. New bills. Mr. President, Senator Labedz would like to have a meeting of the Reference Committee now in the Senate Lounge. Referencing Committee in the Senate Lounge, Mr. President, right now. Senate Lounge for Referencing Committee. New bills. (Read by title for the first time LBs 341-355 as found on pages 183-87 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: We will be at ease for a few minutes for referencing and receiving a few more bills.

EASE

PRESIDENT: (Microphone not activated) and capable of transacting business. I propose to sign and do sign LR 3. Would you like to continue, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: Yes, Mr. President, thank you. New bills. (Read by title for the first time LBs 356-372 as found on pages 187-91 of the Legislative Journal.)

Mr. President, I have a new resolution offered by Senator Hall.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Korshoj.

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Mr. Speaker and members, I totally agree that we need to save as many lives as we can. Tim has already alluded to the fact that it's too late after they get in the bar. I think you're going the wrong place. And, Jacky, I'll tell you how you can save lives and lots of them, and I'm serious about this, have Department of Revenue send out to every retail merchant in the State of Nebraska that sign when they send...they've got the sales tax list, mandate them to put it up, let them read about it before they get in the bar. You would do some good and I would support that. When they are in the bar you might save one life, and bless you, I'm all for that. But let's go, let's let the...let's let them read about it when they go to the grocery store. Mandate them to put that sign up. It's that important to me I would also support the appropriation for it. If every store you go in this sign is posted, like we have to post our sales tax certificate, people are going to see it and think about it. You're going to get damn little thinking going in a bar, some, but not much. If you are really serious and not trying to say it's your duty as a bartender to get this message across, after they are already in the bar, it's after the fact. And I would, if mandated, be glad to put one up in my place of business, but you'd cover the whole state and you would have awareness like you could never get any other place. I'm through, thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. The question before the body is the indefinite postponement of LB 70. Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 4 ayes, 26 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to indefinitely postpone.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The motion fails. Anything to read in, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, I do. Your Committee on Health and Human Services, whose Chair is Senator Wesely, reports LB 353 to General File; LB 48, General File with amendments; LB 231, General File with amendments; LB 273, General File with amendments; LB 366, General File with amendments. emergency clause, did you, Senator Moore? Okay. The question is the Lamb amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of committee amendments.

PRESIDENT: The committee amendments are adopted. Senator Lamb, on the bill.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, members, this is a bill I introduced at the request of a constituent who has a fish, commercial fishing permit, wants to clean out his lake which is mostly owned by this constituent, and sell the fish. And currently, he can sell the nongame fish. He can sell the carp is what we are talking about. He can sell the carp but he can't sell the bullheads. So this is merely giving a person in that situation the opportunity to, rather than just destroy the bullheads that come out of those ponds for fish management purposes, currently, because they are... bullheads are considered a game fish, they cannot be sold. And so after consultation with the Game and Parks Commission, this bill was drafted which was supported by Game and Parks. It merely would allow the sale of those bullheads which are seined. It does not change the status of bullheads as a game fish, but it does allow those fish to be sold or to be constructively used rather than destroyed. I would move the advancement of the bill.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion? If not, the question is the advancement of the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 166.

PRESIDENT: LB 166 is advanced. LB 353, please.

CLERK: LB 353, Mr. President, was a bill introduced by Senator Wesely. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 11, referred to the Health Committee, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Wesely, please.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you. Mr. President and members of the

Legislature, LB 353 is a piece of legislation brought to me by the Department of Social Services and the State Association of Pharmacists. Both want to see this legislation passed. What it would do is allow for Schedule II drugs, and they are listed in our statutes. They are primarily Demerol, Percodan, Percocet, and Ritalin, for these Schedule II drugs, they would allow generic substitution as they already do for Schedule III, IV, and V sets of drugs, and by doing this, what you do is, it is like generic drugs and you are all familiar with that, Tylenol being substituted by Canol (phonetic), for instance. This is a common thing in drugs. We do that to save money. Generic drugs are essentially the same. The FDA does test these out and deem them to be the same or equivalent, I guess is the proper term, and so by allowing this equivalency generic substitution, you have the same impact in use of the drugs but you also save money. It is estimated by the Department of Social Services that this legislation will save something like \$35,000. The Nebraska Medical Association did testify in opposition to the bill. Their concerns were more the problem of how you determine equivalency for all the different generic substitution of drugs that is already going into place right now. The FDA has that responsibility and they are the responsible party for making that determination. No drug can be substituted under this legislation or any other legislation if it hasn't been FDA approved as equivalent. What the Medical Association is concerned about is in the past there have been certain drugs that have been deemed equivalent that some of the doctors feel isn't necessarily equivalent, and so they are worried that if they write out a prescription, and another equivalent drug will be substituted that won't be as good as the one they looking for. This bill provides, and it is currently the situation, that any doctor that doesn't want a substitution for a drug that is prescribed can simply write it on the prescription and will not have it substituted. They have that right and authority. That continues. So for any concerned physician out there, this power would continue with them, and so they really don't have a problem with that. They are trying to make a point and the pharmacists have agreed to meet with the Medical Association and work on this broader question of what we consider to be equivalent and substitutable for generic drugs. I think in general, again, that this is an excellent piece of legislation. It will save money. It will save time. Consumers that are under the Medicaid program, and, again, we are looking for savings in the Medicaid program, this would be a substitution under Medicaid. The consumers now go to the pharmacist and they

have a prescription under Medicaid, and the pharmacist says, can we substitute, it would save you money, and they have to go back to the doctor to get permission. It is all kind of a problem right now, and this would allow it to be automatically substituted through a generic drug use. In addition, the Ritalin that is under this Schedule II is a narcotic that is sometimes used and abused as a street drug. By allowing generic substitution, you have, instead of a clearly identifiable Ritalin brand name street drug, you have a generic substitute and you can't identify whether or not, in fact, it is Ritalin. There is a chance that we can cutoff some of the utilization of Ritalin illegally in our state by having the generic drugs utilized. I think that is a good thing as well. So this piece of legislation should be advanced and I would ask your support for its advancement, and I would answer any questions if there are any on the legislation.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion? If not, the question is the advancement of the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 353.

PRESIDENT: LB 353 is advanced. LB 48, please.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 48 was a bill that was introduced by Senator Dierks, Chambers, Nelson, Schellpeper, Hefner, Lamb, Crosby, and Hartnett. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 5, referred to the Health Committee for a hearing, advanced to General File. I have committee amendments pending by the Health and Human Services Committee, Mr. President. (See page 474 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: Senator Wesely, are you going to take the amendments? All right.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you. Mr. President and members, the Health and Human Services Committee did hear LB 48. LB 48 was introduced by Senator Dierks and Senator Schellpeper, on the committee, Senator Chambers, Nelson, Hefner, Lamb, Crosby and Hartnett. The bill deals with a subject that has been before this Legislature before and the committee dealing with the question of smokeless tobacco and its free distribution. The bill calls for banning the free distribution of smokeless
