SPEAYER BARRETT: Welcome to the George Norris Legislative Chamber, the opening of the 15th day in this, the First Session of the Ninety-first Legislature. For our opening prayer the Chaplain of the day, the Reverend David Quam, Central Alliance Church in Lincoln. Pastor Quam, please.

Mr. President, your Committee on Natural Resources, whose Chair is Senator Schmit, to whom was referred LB 43 instructs me to report the same back to the Legislature with the recommendation it be advanced to General File; LB 113, LB 171, LB 172, all advanced to General File, all signed by Senator Schmit as Chair.

Mr. President, a hearing notice from the Natural Resources Committee for Thursday, February 2. That is all that I have, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. To item number five on the agenda,

PRESIDENT: LB 114 is advanced. May I introduce some guests, please, of Senator Owen Elmer and Speaker Barrett. Under the south balcony, we have Larry Reynolds of Lexington, Nebraska and Doyle Lavine and Kay Lavine of Bertrand. Would you folks please stand and be recognized. Thank you for visiting us today. Move on to LB 43.

CLERK: LB 43, Mr. President, was a bill offered by Senator Bernard-Stevens. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 5, referred to Natural Resources, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Bernard-Stevens, please.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the body, LB 43 simply increases the amount of liquidated damages for unlawfully killing, destroying, taking or possessing certain animals, fowl, birds or fish, such as follows, and can read in through the text if you want. In essence, what we have we divided it into categories. Big game fees would go from 300 to 600. That would be, for example, elk, deer, swan, big horn sheep. Medium game fees from 25 to \$50 on the fine would be examples, turkey, goose, on conservation animals. And then we have the final category which is the statute already, birds and fish from \$5 to \$20. This fee is more than doubled because it was too low for replacement costs originally. Members of the body, these fees, in essence, are the first to change in fees we've had on liquidated damages of these...of this wildlife since 1929. Nothing has really changed since They were, in many cases, undervalued at this time. There are certain states, for example, Kansas, surrounding us, Missouri and Wyoming, who do not have a set value for game as we do in Nebraska. Other states surrounding us, for example, would be Iowa, South Dakota and Colorado. They all have civil penalty similar to Nebraska's statute 37-614 which liquidated damage law. What these fees would do would put us in line, number one, with those states surrounding us. And, number two...in fact, it will put us almost right in the middle of those states surrounding us; and number two, it would increase the deterrent at this point for poachers or poaching that is going on within the state. At the present time, the fees now are not a deterrent whatsoever and thus we feel it will be helpful the wild game animals in this particular area. And, with that, Mr. President, that was the opening comments I have.

yield to any questions. Otherwise, I would ask that the bill be advanced for E & R Initial.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Owen Elmer, please.

SENATOR ELMER: Thank you, Mr. President and members, I sat on the Natural Resources Committee and during the testimony it was brought out that in many areas of the state, mine included, the population of deer almost outnumber the population of people. And in some areas they have become a nuisance. So I questioned the Game and Parks during the hearing as to the areas where overpopulation of one of these big game animals becomes a problem and they said they have in place a procedure whereby farmers or ranchers that are aggrieved with overpopulation of these animals can come to the department or the Game and Parks Commission and...the Game and Parks, and ask for a permit to take care of some of these problems. And Game and Parks does cooperate and, in some instances, it does allow the reduction of numbers of deer and those kind of things that would allow them to take care of those problems without having to pay these liquidated damages, but they do have to get the permission first. I wanted to put those...make these comments for the record and for your information. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Senator Elmer. Senator Wehrbein, please.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. President and members, I would like to ask Senator Bernard-Stevens a question. I noticed you exempted or took out whooping crane. Is there a further explanation of that, other than I...that evidently comes under federal law or...?

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Well, I thought we might make it the state bird, as a possibility, I don't know. I'm sorry, Senator Nelson, I just couldn't resist. This bill came from the Game and Parks and my understanding is that is not...has not and is not a problem in the State of Nebraska and they also felt it was not...did not fit the categories as the bill had. That's the best answer I can give you at this particular point.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I assume it's still protected and if there were some questions being raised.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Now I remember the exact answer I should give you, even before I went to the aide to ask. That's

protected under federal statute so it's not needed in this particular matter. In fact, the federal statutes and penalties are much more strict and severe than we would have at the state level.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay, thank you.

PRESIDENT: Senator Bernard-Stevens, would you like to close on the motion to advance.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: I would waive closing at this time and just move that we advance the bill to E & R Initial.
