PRESIDENT: ...Legislative Chamber. We have with us today, as our chaplain of the day, Reverend Gordon Patterson of the Calvary United Methodist Church in Lincoln. Would you please stand for the invocation.

REVEREND PATTERSON: (Prayer offered.)

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Reverend Patterson. We appreciate your message this morning. Please come back and visit us again. Roll call, please.

CLERK: I have a quorum present, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Do we have any corrections to the Journal today?

CLERK: I have no corrections, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Very good. Do you have any messages, reports or announcements?

CLERK: Mr. President, your Committee on Education, whose Chair is Senator Withem, reports LB 107 to General File; LB 486, General File; LB 487, General File; LB 488, General File; LB 741, General File; LB 259, General File with amendments; LB 575, General File with amendments; LB 174, indefinitely postponed; LB 192, indefinitely postponed; LB 274, indefinitely postponed; LB 370, indefinitely postponed; and LB 738, indefinitely postponed. All of those signed by Senator Withem as Chair. (See pages 1111-16 of the Legislative Journal.)

Mr. President, I have an Attorney General's Opinion addressed to Senator Lamb regarding LB 281. That's all that I have, Mr. President. (See pages 1116-19 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: Thank you. We'll move on to the legislative resolutions, LR 27, by Senator Warner.

CLERK: Mr. President, LR 27 was originally introduced by Senators Warner, Scofield and Hartnett. It asks the Legislature to strongly support the removal of Federal Transportation Trust Funds from the federal budget and urges the Nebraska congressional delegation to work towards such removal. The

SENATOR LANDIS: Senator Withem, on behalf of LB 486.

SENATOR WITHEM: Yes, Mr. President, members of the body, the next three bills are all Education Committee bills. They are all bills that were referred to us by the Department of Education, and they're all relatively minor. They're all also needed to help the department do its job a little more efficiently. The first one deals with things like freeholding petitions and also with ESUs. The major change it makes in freeholding is it takes the State Department of Education totally out of the process. Currently freeholding petitions are appealed to them. If they take action on them, it doesn't really make a whole lot of difference anyway. It goes back to the local level for enactment so we're taking them out of it because it's really not...doesn't make any difference. The second portion of the bill, a couple of years ago we changed the educational service unit statutes to allow for a reorganization transfer of property, school districts leaving one ESU, going to another. One of the things that we have done is, we inadvertently didn't do at that time was we did not make it mandatory that before a school district goes to a new ESU that they need the permission of that new ESU. They have to accept them. This makes that change and also says that the state board can appoint a hearing officer to conduct a public hearing on proposed ESU boundary changes. That's what the bill does. I would urge its acceptance.

SENATOR LANDIS: Senator Withem, there are no lights on. Would you care to close? Senator Withem waives closing. We'll be voting on the advancement of LB 486. Those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote no. The Clerk will record.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays on the advancement of the bill, Mr. President.

SENATOR LANDIS: The bill is advanced. We'll move on to LB 487 by the Education Committee. Mr. Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: Mr. President, LB 487 was introduced by the Education Committee. (Title read.) The bill was read for the first time on January 17. It was referred to the Education Committee. The Education Committee does report the bill to General File, Mr. President.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. Senator Withem, on behalf of LB 487.

SENATOR WITHEM: If everybody was listening to the Clerk's recitation of the title, that is the explanation of what the bill does. Just go right ahead and vote for it. Everything is pretty well laid out in the title actually. This is a clean-up bill by the department, deals with lots of different report dates, fiscal year dates, deletion of obsolete language concerning nonresident high school tuition, requires the county attorney to establish a budget when a school district fails to do so. Sometimes that happens. The annual reports...the dates on annual reports...I guess the only substantive change and the reason that there is an A bill that there may be some questions about is that provides for the reimbursement for special education programs based on a September to August 31 year date as opposed to July 1 to June 30. That September 1 to August 31 is the date used for all education types of fiscal years. They'd like to get this special ed transportation on the same date. To do that it's not going to cost any more net money to the taxpayers to do that, but when changing the fiscal years, there will be a one-time only year when the transfer of money takes place twice in the same fiscal year because we're extending the year. There is a \$300 A bill because of that. That's a one-time expenditure that is a cash flow type of expenditure, it's no additional money. It will show up as additional money because it will be in one fiscal year instead of another. Hopefully that explains it. If there are any questions, I'd attempt to answer them.

SENATOR LANDIS: There are two lights on, Senator Withem. First, Senator Warner, followed by Senator Schellpeper. Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Withem, if you'd yield to a question.

SENATOR LANDIS: Would you yield to a question, Senator Withem?

SENATOR WITHEM: Yes, I will.

SENATOR LANDIS: Proceed.

SENATOR WARNER: So that I'm clear that I understand, on the funding of the transportation, we're adding two more months to the current fiscal year payout for transportation which is the

300,000 but there obviously is no reduction next year because from this point forward those two months are tied on the other end. Right?

SENATOR WITHEM: Right, right.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Senator Warner. Senator Schellpeper, our last light.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Thank you. I also have a question for Senator Withem. Would it help if the schools would all start after Labor Day? Wouldn't that make it a lot more simpler here for this bill?

SENATOR WITHEM: I think that's a very convenient nontechnical Select File amendment that could be offered to this bill.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Thank you.

SENATOR LANDIS: Senator Schellpeper's time has been used so we'll move to Senator Withem, since there are no lights on, to close. Senator Withem. I think that's a waiving off of the closing. We'll proceed to a vote to advance LB 487. Those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote no. The Clerk will record.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the advancement of the bill, Mr. President.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Mr. Clerk, and now the A bill, Mr. Clerk.

agreed to that notion. If there is an insider taking advantage of one of these kinds of transfers, they should have the same chance of having it undone by a court as what currently exists. So this changes the statute of limitations in that one situation from one to four years, where it is now, and in contravention to the uniform language that's just been out. Secondly, the other change is the standard of knowledge that an insider must have and that is to know or have reason to know that a transaction is a fraudulent conveyance. That standard is more objective and, because of that, would be easier to prove than the words found in the bill. With those two changes, the bill meets the objections of a couple of Nebraska practitioners who say that these changes should be made in the uniform language. I've agree to it. I've checked with the authors, as a matter of fact, of the bill and they, too, see that there's some sense to the language. I offer the amendment; urge it's adoption.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Shall the bill be returned? Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, please.

Number one, this is the Education Department's kind of omnibus clean-up bill for this year and Senator Lamb's amendment is an appropriate one to be added to this bill and I am supporting that.
