SPEAKER BARRETT PRESIDING

SPEAKER BARRETT: The Chair is pleased to announce that Senator Jacklyn Smith of Hastings has visiting the Legislature today Dr. Robert Schlock and 20 students from Hastings College, specifically, psychology and law class, in the east balcony, the rear balcony. Dr. Schlock, would you and your students please stand and be recognized by your Legislature. Thank you. We are pleased to have you visiting with us today. Also under the north balcony from David City High School, Senator Schmit announces the following guests, 8 students from David City High School with their teacher. Would you folks please stand and be recognized. Thank you for visiting. We are glad to have you. Mr. Clerk, more bill introductions, please.

CLERK: Mr. President, first of all, your Committee on Urban Affairs, whose Chair is Senator Hartnett, to whom was referred LB 53, instructs me to report the same back to the Legislature with the recommendation that it be advanced to General File; LB 57 General File; LB 123 General File, all signed by Senator Hartnett as Chair of the committee.

Mr. President, new bills. (LBs 539-557 read for the first time by title. See pages 269-72 the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR HEFNER PRESIDING

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. Clerk, do you have some more bills to introduce?

ASSISTANT CLERK: Yes, I do, Mr. President. (LBs 558-593 read for the first time by title. See pages 273-81 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR HEFNER: Do you want to read the bills into the record?

CLERK: Yes, Mr. President, thank you. (LBs 594-597 read for the first time by title. See page 281 of the Legislative Journal.)

Mr. President, in addition to those items, I have new resolutions. (Read a brief explanation of LRs 8-12. See

state. The amendment simply adds some more technical language to it and also allows someone an exemption, if you turn on to the back on page 4, line 13, inserts the word "any engineer or person working under the direct supervision of an engineer", for that exemption so it broadens it a little bit more. I would simply ask the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lynch, did you wish to speak about the amendment? Senator Baack suggests you might use a better example, Senator Moore. (laughter) The question is the adoption of the Moore amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Moore's amendment.

PRESIDENT: The Moore amendment is adopted. Now, Senator Moore, on the advancement of the bill.

SENATOR MOORE: With that being my first amendment I've got adopted this year, I would like to continue that trend and move the bill.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion? The question is the advancement of the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 263.

PRESIDENT: The bill is advanced. Mr. Clerk, anything for the record?

CLERK: Mr. President, I do. Your Committee on Agriculture whose Chair is Senator Rod Johnson instructs me to report LB 548 to General File and LB 582 to General File, those reports signed by Senator Johnson. (See page 652 of the Legislative Journal.)

Mr. President, new A bill LB 214A by Senator Landis. (Read by title for the first time. See pages 652-53 of the Legislative Journal.)

Mr. President, a series of adds. Senator Conway would like to add his name to LB 238; Senator Ashford to LB 140; Senator Chizek to LB 89. (See page 653 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR L. JOHNSON: LB 548 is advanced. The next bill is LB 582.

CLERK: LB 582, Mr. President, by Senator Rod Johnson and Senator Dierks. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 18, referred to the Agriculture Committee, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Mr. President.

SENATOR L. JOHNSON: The Chair recognizes Senator Johnson.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Mr. President and members, I was asked to introduce LB 582 for the purposes of allowing the Nebraska Beef Checkoff Board to collect and keep 50 cents of the dollar they now collect. Currently, in Nebraska we collect a \$1.00 per head checkoff fee that is spent for promotion and development and education of our beef products. Nebraska has statutory authority to collect 25 cents. We are the only state, out of 43 state councils, that is not authorized to keep up to 50 cents. We can keep up to 25 cents. Of that 25 cents, 16 cents of it goes out of the state, 15 cents goes to the National Beef Council and one cent to the United State Meat Export Federation. Nine cents of that 25 cents that we collect stays in Nebraska and is implemented and utilized by the Nebraska Beef Checkoff Board. That 25 cents that we collect constitutes about, I think about \$1.6 million that is kept in Nebraska, but 90 percent of that money is actually collected here but sent out of the state. The purpose of the bill and the fact the bill will be important to the Nebraska cattlemen and to the Nebraska Checkoff Program is that we can keep an additional 25 cents to use discretionarily by the Nebraska Beef Checkoff Board. Currently, there are two boards that we are members of, the National Cattlemen's Beef Board, which 75 cents right now goes toward the National Beef Board, but the membership of that board is determined by the number of cattle in the state. Texas usually has been the number one state in cattle on feed and so they have the most membership on that board. That figure is changing as cattle on feed numbers change in Nebraska. But the National Livestock and Meat Board, which is composed of the Beef Council, the Pork Council, the Lamb and Veal Councils, that membership is determined by the number of dollars or the amount of dollars that are actually contributed to the board. Nebraska, if they chose to keep the extra 25 cents and send it in that direction toward the National Livestock and Meat board, could have a greater voice and pick up, potentially, up to two

more board members for Nebraska on that board. That would give us more strength, more say on the board and I think would give us more power as far as the direction that the National Livestock and Meat Board would take. I don't believe, and I think it's very clear if you talk with Nebraska Beef Board members, that they want to keep the additional 25 cents to spend solely here in Nebraska. That is not their intent. They simply see this as an opportunity to comply with what all the other states are currently doing that have a promotional board, allows some discretionary use of funds that we don't have right now and I think would give us some more political muscle in some circles, livestock circles, that I think we deserve. And so, as I said, the bill is relatively simple but could have a positive impact on the say and the direction that some of these national boards have, considering Nebraska is quickly becoming the leading cattle feeding state in the nation and I think those numbers are only going to continue to grow and I think, as those numbers grow, it is evident to me, at least, that Nebraska's potential power and say on these boards should be recognized and this is one way we can do that. So I would urge for the advancement of the bill.

SPEAKER BARRETT PRESIDING

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Discussion? Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body, to reiterate a little bit like what Senator Johnson said, this is a good bill. It will put Nebraska back on even footing with the other beef producing states. The money that will change or be shifted within the collection process back to the Nebraska Beef Board for their allocation is fairly restricted by statute as to how they can use it. So the money will be used basically in the same fashion that it is currently used. The only difference will be that Nebraska will again have control over half of the beef checkoff which is comparable to other states. So I would also encourage the advancement of LB 582.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Any other discussion? If not, the question is the advancement of LB 582. Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Shall LB 582 be advanced? Record, please.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance LB 582.

It allows for the use of a placard that would hang from the rear view mirror, readily visible for enforcement individuals as well as easily transferred from vehicle to vehicle because it is the individual who has the handicap, not the vehicle. And this is for those folks who currently use a card that is something similar to the size of an eight and a half by fourteen sheet of paper, roughly, and it's difficult for them to put that in their shirt pocket. This would provide for something that would be both visible and readily moveable from vehicle to vehicle. I would urge the...it also allows, the bill also allows that the department would use whatever supply of the current cards up prior to doing this. So I would urge the advancement of the bill.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Any discussion? If not, those in favor of the advancement of the bill, please vote aye, opposed nay. Record.
