Thank you. We're glad to have you with us. While the Legislature is in session and capable of transacting business, I propose to sign and I do sign engrossed LB 165. Mr. Clerk, for the record.

CLERK: Mr. President, items for the record. Senator Labeledz would move to withdraw LB 365. Senator Barrett has amendments to be printed to LB 408.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of 534.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The ayes have it. The bill is advanced. LB 601, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: LB 601, Mr. President, offered by Senator Withem. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 19 of 1989, referred to the Government, Military, and Veterans Affairs Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File with committee amendments attached, Mr. President. (See page 780 of the Legislative Journal, First Session.)

SPEAKER BARRETT: The Chair recognizes the Governor...Government Chair, Senator Baack.

SENATOR BAACK: I don't know. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, or Mr. Congre...no, I mean Speaker, yeah. Okay, this is another bill that the Government Committee heard and there was no opposition at the hearing to this bill, also. What the bill does is says that if two people are going to run as either a team or a slate, it would say that once they have raised \$2,000 as that team or slate they would have to file financial disclosure statements with the Accountability Commission. The committee amendment simply specifies that the expenditure or the gathering of \$2,000, the expenditure side of it does not include the filing fee, and this just makes it consistent with the rules that govern an individual. After they've raised a certain amount of money, they do not count their filing fee as part of that expenditure either. So it just makes it consistent with the other statutes. With that, I would just urge adoption of the committee amendment.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Any discussion on the committee amendments? Seeing none, those in favor of the adoption of those same amendments vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of committee amendments.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The committee amendments are adopted. Senator Withem, would you care to explain the bill as amended.

SENATOR WITHEM: Yes, I would, Mr. Speaker. This is a bill that came to us from a kind of strange situation that arose down in Bellevue where lots of strange situations arise, Senator Hartnett. The current statute calls for filing a campaign statement when \$2,000 or more is raised. Last year the Bellevue School Board election, there were three candidates who felt that they had views very similar to each other and that they might have more of an impact on the election if the three of them campaigned together. So they pooled their campaign resources, bought all their campaign materials, campaign signs, advertisements together, and campaigned as a team. When people began to look around and says, my gosh, there must have been more than \$2,000 spent on all of this information, they haven't filed yet, yeah, I don't know just exactly what was said, but my assumption is they says, well, the law really says \$2,000 per candidate, and so until we raise \$6,000, we shouldn't have to file. Well, what this bill clarifies is, again, what I think is the original intent that if a committee is formed and the candidates are campaigning as a team under a single committee, once \$2,000 is raised, they should have to comply with the statute for reporting. And I see after dinging him a little bit, Senator Hartnett turned his light on, so maybe he can shed a little more light on the situation. Again, it is a fairly simple bill and I'd urge you to support it.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. For discussion purposes, Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. Speaker,, and members of the body, I think Senator Withem did an excellent job of explaining because I think that when these, it was a candidate of three of people ran, it was really unclear in the state law as it relates to accountability whether they had...they could raise over \$3,000 and it could be separate, and so I think what Senator Withem is doing is to...it clarifies, with this bill, it clarifies that if it is a team of people running together as a slate, once they hit that threshold with \$2,000, their accountability kicks in, and so I support this bill wholeheartedly. Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Any other discussion on the bill? Senator Withem, for close.

SENATOR WITHEM: I would waive closing.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. The question is, shall LB 601 be

SPEAKER BARRETT: To the committee amendments, is anyone prepared to handle the committee amendments to LB 730? Senator Lamb, in Senator Schmit's absence, is it possible for you to handle those amendments?

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, and members, this is a bill which provides for an increase in salaries for public power district directors. The original bill would increase the compensation for the large power districts, \$40 million or more, from 6,900 to 9,600, and president from 7,200 to 10,800. The committee amendment would permit an increase in compensation from 500 to 800 dollars per month for board members and from six to nine hundred dollars per month for the chairperson of a metropolitan water or utilities district, and would permit an increase in compensation from 3,600 to 4,800 dollars per year for board members, and from 4,200 to 4,500 dollars per year for the president of boards of directors of districts with gross revenues of less than \$40 million. So the committee amendment also grants increases for smaller power districts. I move the adoption of the committee amendment.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you, Senator Lamb. Any discussion on the committee amendments? Senator Warner. Senator Schellpeper, on the amendments? Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Mr. President, just a question, if Senator Lamb would respond, please.
