SPEAKER BARRETT: That was a part of the criteria.

SENATOR HABERMAN: What is the other part, please?

SPEAKER BARRETT: The difficulty of the bill, the whether or not it had a substantial fiscal impact, there were a number of facts which entered into the decision. It was not a final decision of the Chair alone, but also in consultation with at least two committee counsels in most cases.

SENATOR HABERMAN: May I ask what would a financial fiscal note please be, what range of figures?

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Haberman, I'm not sure how long I want to continue this discussion. I will answer your question. LB 834 was removed from the consent calendar consideration because of the financial impact.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Fine...

SPEAKER BARRETT: That was in consultation with two committee counsels as well as my office.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you very much, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Mr. Clerk, LB 610, correction, LB 602, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, 602 was a bill originally introduced by Senators Warner and Hartnett. (Read title.) The bill was introduced January 19 last year, referred to Appropriations, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this bill is almost corrective, I suppose, in nature. Under the current statutes there is a provision for how the funds flow that are deposited to the Highway Cash Fund. One of those provisions require, because the Highway Cash Fund, excuse me, the Highway Trust Fund has as one of its first obligations, retirement of any bonded indebtedness that the flow mechanism is such, and it is only an accounting procedure, that money is placed in that fund in order to meet debt service and then distributed on through to the various governmental subdivisions in the state that receive the money. Inasmuch that there is no bonded indebtedness at the moment, why, what the bill does is it eliminates that paper process unless bonds are issued in which that trust fund becomes a part of the security for those bonds, and so I would...that's all the bill does. It eliminates a paper process that is of no necessity unless there would be bonds issued and which, of course, could not be done without the approval of the Legislature, depending on how those bonds were authorized, there is no need for the current statute. adds to the processing cost of accounting for funds which it has obviously a very incidental cost, but nevertheless, an unnecessary process. I'd move the bill be advanced.

PRESIDENT NICHOL PRESIDING

PRESIDENT: Senator Hartnett, please.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Yes, Mr. President, members of the body, I simply rise to support this bill. I think we passed a bonding bill for highways a couple of years ago and no bonds have been issued. As Senator Warner suggested this, that the Legislature would have to approve issuance of bonds and this is just simply a clarification where it could be classified a revisor bill and so I simply rise to support the advancement of this bill. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Any closing, Senator Warner? Senator Warner, any closing? Okay, the question is the advancement of the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Please

Very simply put, this bill would provide that any person owning any two or more motor vehicles required to be registered in the State of Nebraska has the option to elect to register both of the vehicles on a calendar year basis so the same registration period beginning in a month selected by the owner of the vehicles. At present this registration alternative may be utilized by individuals owning three or more vehicles and we have changed the language from three to two. It basically is a provision that will make government more responsive to the taxpayer and it will only take one trip to the county courthouse instead of two to pay the annual tax, and I would move that this bill be advanced.

I can go to the hospital, even...and have them stick a knife in my body and work on it. I don't think people are going to do that. And, if they're injured, I don't think they're just going . to be lapping up all this cream that we're so concerned about. There are times when you're drawing workmen's comp when you can be taxed by the federal government. In certain situations, you are on a light duty status, where you can't make it on the existing workmen's comp, and the employer says, well, come back, we'll give you light duty and we'll give you a little bit of a wage, not your total wage, and then your workmen's comp makes up what your total wage would have been, then that is all balled into a wage, and that is taxed. You can check it out if you'd like. So there are times it is taxed on the federal level, when you can't make it and are forced to go back to work, often times after further aggravating your injuries, but you just can't make it. So that's what...that's how light duty came into existence, because of poor workmen's comp. We know you're injured but...and we know you can't make it, so come on back and we'll give you a little bit to do a little bit. It might further aggravate your injury, might make things worse in the long-run, but we know you can't make it, so come on back, you'll help us out at a cheap rate. And, oh, by the way, you will be taxed on your workmen's comp, too. They probably leave that part out. But I don't think we're going to have people, part-time employees, rushing out to injure themselves so they can draw this extra 20 bucks a week, or whatever it is. I don't think we have a big concern about that and I would support Senator Hall's amendment.
