Mr. President, in addition to those items, I have hearing notice from the Natural Resources Committee, signed by Senator Schmit. Notice of hearing from the Revenue Committee. That is signed by Senator Hall. Notice of hearing from the Government Committee. That's signed by Senator Baack.

Mr. President, that's all that I have at this time.

PRESIDENT: We will progress on to LB 190.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 190 was a bill that was introduced Senator Withem. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 9, referred to Education, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: (Gavel.) Senator Withem, just a moment, maybe we

CLERK: Mr. President, your Committee on Judiciary, whose Chair is Senator Chizek, to whom was referred LB 147 instructs me to report the same back to the Legislature with the recommendation it be advanced to General File; LB 224 General File, LB 265 General File, LB 397 General File. Those are signed by Senator Chizek as Chair. Natural Resources Committee whose Chair is Senator Schmit reports LB 132 to General File, LB 619 General File, LB 623 General File. Those are signed by Senator Schmit as Chair.

SENATOR LAMB: Yes, Mr. President, members. This is a bill that was introduced by the Natural Resources Committee. As you will note, there were no negative votes when the bill came out of committee and there were no opponents to the bill at the public hearing. The bill provides amendments to the Nebraska Chemigation Act. As you probably know natural resources districts are required to inspect persons who are believed by the district to be chemigating without a required permit. And prior to inspection the district must give notice of intent to inspect and make a reasonable effort to obtain consent for the inspection. In emergency situations inspections may occur without a warrant. This really closes a little bit of a loophole in the Chemigation Act that we have passed previously, and I might add has been pretty well accepted statewide as protection to our water supply. This merely gives the natural resources district additional authority to go onto the land and inspect the systems. I would ask that the bill be advanced.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Is there discussion on the advancement of the bill? If not, those in favor of the advancement of LB 619 please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, please.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays on the advancement of the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: LB 619 is advanced. LB 623, Mr. Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: LB 623 was also introduced by the Natural Resources Committee. (Read title.) The bill was read for the first time on January 19, was referred to the Natural Resources. That committee reports the bill back to General File without committee amendments, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Lamb, please.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, members, this is another bill, as explained by the Clerk, that was introduced by the Natural Resources Committee. There were no opponents at the public hearing. The bill advanced from the committee without negative votes. It does amend the state revolving loan fund legislation which was enacted last session. Under that legislation municipalities became eligible for loans from the Nebraska

Department of Environmental Control to construct or modify publicly owned sewage treatment works. The amendments proposed by LB 623 are for the most part the result of a statutory review by the U.S. EPA. Most of the comments from EPA had to do with clarification of fund and account management. Other substantive changes proposed by the bill are the creation of a discounted interest rate for short-term loans and the expansion of the definition of eligible items for construction. This is a relatively minor bill. I would ask that the bill be advanced.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Any discussion? If not, Senator Lamb, any closing statement? Thank you. Those in favor of the advancement of LB 623 to E & R Initial vote aye, opposed nay. Voting on the advancement of the bill. Record, please.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays on the advancement of the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: LB 623 is advanced. The Chair is pleased to take a moment, before we proceed to one last bill, to introduce some guests of Senators Chizek and Hannibal in the north balcony. We have 30 seventh grade students from Millard North Middle School and their assistant principal and five other adults. Would you people please stand and be recognized by the Legislature. Thank you. We're glad to have you with us. Mr. Clerk, LB 155.

ASSISTANT CLERK: LB 155 was introduced by Senators Rogers and Pirsch. (Read title.) The bill was read for the first time on the fifth of January, was referred to the Transportation Committee. They report the bill back to General File with committee amendments attached, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Lamb, Chair of the committee, please.

SENATOR LAMB: Yes, Mr. President, members, this is a bill that has to do with sunscreens, windows, the dark, dark windows in cars. I'll not explain the bill, but I will only note that this will place some restrictions on sunscreening. I think it's primarily...the primary interest has been by law enforcement officers because they feel threatened when they walk up to a vehicle with dark windows. The committee amendment only provide a couple of exceptions whereby this sunscreening, dark sunscreening can be allowed. One is if the State Patrol or a law enforcement agency decides that they should grant a waiver

But if you are going to have a bill like this, where you can have a noncertified document used in this state for the purpose of depriving an individual of a right or a privilege, then the least you can do is say that it will apply only to things that occur after the date that the bill is passed.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Discussion. Senator Lamb, followed by Senator Lindsay.

SENATOR LAMB: Yes, Mr. President and members, you will remember that there was extended discussion about this bill previously. This has to do with points taken off your license from other states, and this bill allows the Department of Motor Vehicles to certify that in fact you have been convicted in another state, and that the record is true and correct. We have gotten an Attorney General's Opinion on the bill in regard to whether it violates the rules of evidence. The Attorney General's Opinion has been positive. He says the bill is okay, and in regard to
