SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. On Senator Johnson's motion to advance the bill, is there discussion? Seeing none, Senator Rod Johnson, anything further? The question is then the advancement of LB 36 to E & R Initial. Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Voting on the advancement of LB 36. Have you all voted? Record, please.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 mays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 36.

SPEAKER BARRETT: LB 36 is advanced. New bills, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, new bills. (Read title for the first time to LBs 648-661. See pages 309-12 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BARRETT: Mr. Clerk, proceed to LB 38 on General File, please.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 38 offered by Senator Rod Johnson. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 5, referred to the Agriculture Committee, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: (Gavel.) Senator Rod Johnson, to present LB 38.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Mr. Speaker and members, again, housekeeping bill, this time for the Department of Agriculture. Covers three basic areas in the statutes that affect the department. The first area in Section 1 of the bill affects definitions as it relates to the Nebraska Poultry Disease Sections 3 through 5 deal with the Manufactured Control Act. Milk Act and this might be one of the more controversial areas of the bill. In Section 4, it amends the law to require new permittees who run dairies to have hot and cold running water in the milkhouse as of October 1 of 1989. This might controversial. However, the dairymen have come in and testified in support of the bill and feel that any new construction of a dairy house should incorporate both hot and cold water for sanitation reasons. Finally, in Section 6, it approves new rules and regulations that will be adopted by the state veterinarian as it concerns the Nebraska Swine Brucellosis Act. Again, most of this is technical. The hot and cold running water in the dairy house is an area that does have some concern,

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. You've heard the closing and the question is the advancement of LB 336. Those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Voting on the advancement of the bill. Have you all voted? Record, please.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 mays on the advancement of 336, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: LB 336 is advanced. For the record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have notice of hearing, appointment, gubernatorial conferee hearing by the General Affairs Committee, Mr. President.

Senator Pirsch has amendments to be printed to LB 257. (See page 886 of the Legislative Journal.)

Urban Affairs Committee whose Chair is Senator Hartnett reports LB 670 is indefinitely postponed and LB 800 as indefinitely postponed. (See page 886 of the Legislative Journal.)

Mr. President, Senators Goodrich, Nelson and Lowell Johnson would like to add their name to LB 809 as co-introducer. (See page 887 of the Legislative Journal.) That's all that I have, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Senator Hall, would you care to adjourn us until tomorrow morning, please.

SENATOR HALL: Mr. President, I would...as soon as we drop these on the Clerk's desk, is that possible? (laughter) My committee, what can I say? We could read those in I...

SPEAKER BARRETT: Any messages on the President's desk, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, I have some late messages that have arrived.
