SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Discussion on the advancement of the bill? Anything further, Senator Weihing, there are no lights on?

SENATOR WEIHING: Nothing further, thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. The question is then the advancement of LB 53 to E & R. Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 53.

SPEAKER BARRETT: LB 53 is advanced. Anything for the record, Mr. Clerk?

Secretary of State to set various fees for collection agencies not to exceed certain specified amounts. Currently, a flat fee is set in statute for the various types of the licenses. current fees and revenue and the proposed maximum fees and maximum revenue are detailed and outlined in the fiscal note attached to the bill in your bill book. Please note that while the bill allows these maximum fees, the actual fees will be set by the Secretary of State and may be lower than these amounts since the bill also specifies that the fees charged shall not amounts actually necessary to sustain the administration and enforcement actions. The setting of maximum or range of fees for licenses or permits rather than a flat fee has been an accepted and established policy. Examples of such policy in our state agencies now exist in the areas of agriculture, insurance, accountancy, roads, health, Service Commission, engineers and architects and the fire marshal. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Senator Johnson. There are no lights on, so you're recognized to close if you wish.

SENATOR L. JOHNSON: I hope that there is some left. I waive closing. Thank you.

SENATOR LANDIS: All right, we'll waive closing.

SENATOR L. JOHNSON: Move for advancement of LB 206.

SENATOR LANDIS: The question is the advancement of LB 206. Those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote no. Let me inform the body that the Pages have been collecting a quick survey of the body and we have exactly 25 members here. It varies between 24, 25 and 26, depending on who is in and out of the room at any one moment. So we'll be able to transact our business depending on how rapidly each and every member of the body performs their tasks and votes. The Clerk will record.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the advancement of bill, Mr. President.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you. That advances LB 206. We'll move on to LB 669, handled today by Senator Lindsay on behalf of Senator Hall. Mr. Clerk.

ASSISTANT CLERK: Mr. President, LB 669 was introduced by

Senator Hall. (Title read.) The bill was read for the first time on January 19. It was referred to Judiciary Committee. They report the bill advanced to General File.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. Senator Lindsay, on behalf of Senator Hall.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Mr. President and colleagues, LB 669 is a bill which relates to probation. The thrust of the bill is to allow judges a little more leeway in the area of probation. It affects just one section and that section is that dealing with jail time involved in probation. What the bill would do very simply is that for a misdemeanor the greatest amount of jail time that could be served by a defendant would be the maximum amount stated by ... in the statutes. the time that could be served would be 180 days. The reason for that is it gives judges leeway a little bit on probations for felonies that if they feel that somebody...the current statute allows 90 days. If they feel somebody deserves probation but 90 days isn't going to do it, this gives them a little more leeway that they can give up to 180 days and still allow that person to be on probation. Conversely, on misdemeanors, what is occurring on occasion is that somebody is sentenced probation, and for a crime that may have a maximum of seven days, they are getting much in excess of that. The statute allows on probation up to 90 days. It's a case that could be appealed, but practically speaking, nobody can get an appeal up there because of jail time served before an appeal can be heard. I would urge the adoption of the bill.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Senator Lindsay, there are no lights on. You are recognized to close. Senator Lindsay waives closing. We'll proceed to a vote on LB 669. Those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote no. The Clerk will record.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the advancement of the bill, Mr. President.

SENATOR LANDIS: The motion carries. The bill is advanced. We'll go on to LB 486, an Education Committee bill. Mr. Clerk.
