SPEAKER BARRETT: More bill introductions, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Read LB 151-160 by title for the first time. See pages 76-79 of the Legislative Journal.) Mr. President, in addition to those new bills I have new resolutions. (Read LR 1-2 for the first time. See pages 79-81 of the Legislative Journal.)

Mr. President, in addition to those items I have a series of announcements. Mr. President, there will be a meeting of the Executive Board today at three-fifteen for purposes of referencing. Executive Board, three-fifteen for referencing.

Mr. President, Senator Rod Johnson would like to have a meeting

Mr. President, in addition to that notice, a notice from Senator Warner, as Chair of the Credentials Committee regarding a meeting of that committee on Friday at twelve o'clock in Room 2102. That is all that I have, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Proceeding then to LB 142.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 142 was a bill introduced by Senators Baack and Conway. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 5, referred to Transportation, advanced to General File. I have Transportation Committee amendments pending, Mr. President. (See page 439 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BARRETT: The Chair of the Transportation Committee, Senator Lamb. (Gavel.)

SENATOR LAMB: Thank you, Mr. President. This is another bill similar to the last one, disabled American veterans license plate, \$5 fee. The committee amendments establish the \$5 fee, also provides the logo D.A.V on the bottom of the license plate, and then this bill is also used as a vehicle to change the fees for Pearl Harbor survivors and ex-prisoner of war special plates to be consistent with the \$5 fee, and provides for an effective date of January 1, 1990, so that these new plates will not have to be issued before the new round of plates are issued in 1990. So that would save that expense. The arguments in regard to the \$5 fee have already been made on the previous bill, and this amendment merely brings the disabled American veterans and the

Chamberlain from Tekamah. Would you folks please stand and be recognized. Thank you. LB 80, please.

CLERK: LB 80, Mr. President, offered by Senator Korshoj. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 5, referred to Judiciary, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Korshoj, please.

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Mr. President and members, this is a very straightforward bill. It was brought to me by the Indian Commission. Steve Provost discovered that an Indian could only get a marriage license in the county of their residence. And they're the only people in the State of Nebraska that cannot get a marriage license any place in the State of Nebraska. So all this bill does is bring the Indians under the same set of laws as anybody else in the state. And talking to the Government Committee, they said we had better get this passed or we're going to have a discrimination suit. So I would just, therefore, ask for the advancement of this bill.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion on the bill? If not, the question is the advancement of the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 80.

PRESIDENT: LB 80 advances. LB 82, please.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 82 introduced by Senator Korshoj. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 5, referred to Judiciary, advanced to General File. I have no committee amendments. Mr. President, Senator Korshoj would move to amend the bill by adding the emergency clause thereto.

PRESIDENT: Senator Korshoj, please. Do you want to talk about your amendment first, please.

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Well, I'm just asking...Mr. President and members, I would like to get the emergency clause put on this bill. It's a bill that our Clerk of the District Court would like very badly as quick as possible so she could get an updated list for jury selection.

PRESIDENT: Okay. Any further discussion on the emergency clause amendment? If not, the question is the adoption of the amendment by Senator Korshoj. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Need a little help, please. Thank you. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Korshoj's amendment.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted. Now to the bill, Senator Korshoj, please.

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Mr. President and members, all this bill actually does is adds where you can get your list for jury duty. The way the law reads now you would have to get it once a year from Motor Vehicles Division and that would be free in December. And if you get it any other time during the year, you would have to pay for it. And there are several courthouses that have that same information in the treasurer's office and Washington County happens to be one of them. So it would make it much less expensive and you could get your jury list up to date any time of the year. My aide just handed me a note from Charlene Marchand, Clerk of the Court of Sarpy County, and she is very much for it because they also have that information in their She says the jury pool is exhausted in other months courthouse. while the DMV only provides the list at no cost once a year in To obtain other lists, the jury commissioners must December. pay the DMV. This bill would provide another source of eligible jurors at minimal cost from the county treasurer. And she did ask for the emergency clause also. But we do not change the Division of Motor Vehicles, you can still get it there, but this just gives another source. And the bill just says "and or" then your county treasurer. And it's no cost to the state and it would probably be saving to the counties that have that information in the treasurer's office. I ask that you advance that bill. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. The question is the advancement to E & R Initial of LB 82. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Help. Thank you. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of LB 82.

PRESIDENT: LB 82 advances. LB 200, please.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 200 was a bill that was introduced by Senator Chizek. (Read title.) It was introduced on January 9, referred to Judiciary, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chizek, please.

SENATOR CHIZEK: Mr. President and colleagues, it was brought to our attention that the Supreme Court, in 1984, decided that the Legislature had failed to provide any penalty for theft of mislaid property when the value of that property was less than \$100. In all other types of theft less than \$100, such as theft by taking, misrepresentation, and so on, a penalty is provided. The court did say there was a penalty if the value was over \$100. So what we have is a small loophole to close with LB 200. And it simply makes that conduct a misdemeanor. One example would be if a woman had bought some books and was reading them in a coffee shop mall cafe, laid the books down to walk back and get a napkin but forgets about the books. Joe takes the books. If the book is valued at less than \$100, no crime. If the book is valued at more than \$100, it's a misdemeanor. I have been asked the question...Senator Chambers had asked me the question if someone had ordered seven or eight magazine subscriptions in his name and sent them to his house, would this apply in instance? No it would not apply in that instance because contract law, et-cetera, and those who accept those magazine subscriptions have the responsibility to see that they have the right person contract and so this would not have any bearing, Senator Chambers. I would ask for the adoption of the bill...or the advancement of the bill.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Chambers, please.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, Senator Chizek did deal with the issue that concerns me about the bili. That having been resolved, I have no problem with it. But what has happened to me and will probably happen to some of you all, if you become what is considered controversial, magazines are subscribed to, various items and products are written...I mean, are sent to me through companies supposedly because I have made a request through the mail or by phone for those items. The only thing, I mean, you cannot be put in a position of having to return things that are sent to you through
