needed to go back and change our Medicare Supplement Insurance Act to reflect appropriate language. Changes in this bill include clarifying internal references, prohibiting Medicare and supplemental insurance policies from containing benefits which duplicate benefits provided by Medicare, to require the Director of Insurance to issue rules and regs to establish minimum standards for claim payments, marketing practices, compensation and reporting practices for these kinds of arrangements insurance and to repeal language regarding compensation of agents because such regulation will be covered in rules and regs required by the new language of Section 44-3605. At the time we mandated at least 5 percent of the funds in the Soil and February 7, 1990 LB 906, 907

Water Conservation Fund had to be set aside for that purpose. The NRDs have found that there is very good compliance and that they have had minimal need for mandated control efforts, therefore, they want to reduce from 5 percent to 2 percent the amount of money which they must set aside. Otherwise, they will have far too much money in this fund. And there were no opponents to the bill and I recommend that it be advanced.

There are two districts now that are in the process of merger. would hope that this would encourage additional districts to merge and bring about additional efficiency in the area of public power. I can go to the hospital, even...and have them stick a knife in my body and work on it. I don't think people are going to do that. And, if they're injured, I don't think they're just going . to be lapping up all this cream that we're so concerned about. There are times when you're drawing workmen's comp when you can be taxed by the federal government. In certain situations, if you are on a light duty status, where you can't make it on the existing workmen's comp, and the employer says, well, come back, we'll give you light duty and we'll give you a little bit of a wage, not your total wage, and then your workmen's comp makes up what your total wage would have been, then that is all balled into a wage, and that is taxed. You can check it out if you'd like. So there are times it is taxed on the federal level, when you can't make it and are forced to go back to work, often times after further aggravating your injuries, but you just can't make it. So that's what...that's how light duty came into existence, because of poor workmen's comp. We know you're injured but...and we know you can't make it, so come on back and we'll give you a little bit to do a little bit. It might further aggravate your injury, might make things worse in the long-run, but we know you can't make it, so come on back, you'll help us out at a cheap rate. And, oh, by the way, you will be taxed on your workmen's comp, too. They probably leave that part out. But I don't think we're going to have people, part-time employees, rushing out to injure themselves so they can draw this extra 20 bucks a week, or whatever it is. I don't think we have a big concern about that and I would support Senator Hall's amendment.
